Softball Australia Recognises Umpires' Contribution

Softball Australia continues to introduce initiatives to recognise the contribution, at the highest level, of its members. Some time ago, Softball Australia introduced the presentation of player numbers, hats and certificates to players, both female and male, who have represented Australia, at the open level.

Umpires who have gained Level 6 accreditation, or the previous, equivalent, All Australian Badge, will also now be similarly recognised. These umpire will receive a certificate and a hat, both carry their "number". The All Australian Badge was first introduced in 1954, with Esther Deason being awarded Number 1. To date there have been 145 Australian umpires.

The first presentation of numbers, hats and certificates occurred at the 2007 combined 60th Anniversary Open Nationals in Sydney. Similar presentations have been held at each of the 2007 Nationals Championships. The umpires, who have been presented, to date, are

Mentoring

(A pocket Guide to practical coaching and learning for Softball Umpiring)

Why do you umpire? It may be to achieve success in umpiring, the need to belong to a group, gain friends, maintain your involvement in softball, enhance personal fitness or purely in the pursuit of gaining new knowledge and skills. It may even be to earn some extra money.

Whatever your reason, you must accept that your primary role is to manage games, on behalf of your association, and to apply the rules of the game so that no one team gains an unfair advantage over any other team. In order to carry out this role you need knowledge and skills that can be gained through a simple training process known as mentoring.

Mentoring is a two-way process between two people. It requires one person who is willing to learn and another person who has some knowledge and skills to pass on - and a desire to teach.

As far as softball officiating goes, you can easily spend your career filling both these roles as you work towards your personal goals. You may spend a lot of time learning and maintaining your skills as you work with fellow umpires in your quest for continuous personal improvement. It does not matter how long you have been umpiring, you will always find someone who has been doing it for a longer or shorter time than you. Therefore you will always have the opportunity to learn or to pass on your expertise from, or to, another person. As both a learner and mentor you must always remember constructive criticism will be given honestly and accurately about your performance as an umpire - not as an individual. You are a respected and valuable member of the team.

A mentor must have knowledge of the sport and a basic understanding of officials' coaching techniques to plan, organise, communicate, observe, analyse, evaluate and assist improving performance. The outcome of the process may be a set of **SMART** self-improvement goals that are **S**pecific, **M**easurable, **A**chievable, **R**ecorded and reviewed, and **T**ime bound.

Your Mentor can help you to:

- See your strengths and weaknesses;
- Clarify your goals;
- Identify options and directions;
- Assist you to decide actions necessary to achieve your goals;
- Assist in overcoming barriers to progress; and
- Access skills and knowledge you require.

As a Mentor you should:

- Be willing to assist another person's growth and development;
- Have good communication and feedback skills;
- Have current skills, technical competence and experience;
- Be trustworthy and maintain confidentiality;
- Be empathetic and prepared to share experiences;
- Have effective listening skills;
- Have knowledge of organisation and culture;
- Be flexible and open to new ideas;
- Maintain a network of contacts;
- Be accessible and commit the time required for a mentoring relationship;
- Enjoy giving encouragement and support on a one-on-one basis;
- The ability to handle conflict;
- Status/credibility/personal power/charisma;
- Be prepared to act as a role model;
- Have a sense of humour;
- Be enthusiastic.

Before the Game

Preparation for a game should include discussion of short-term goals to be achieved during a game. It must be clear to all members of the umpiring crew which aspect of knowledge and skills each member will be working towards improving. If no specific goal has been set or discussed there may be a request to observe and identify problems, which can then be discussed during or after the game.

During the Game

Your primary focus should be on managing the game, for the benefit of the game and the players. Pre-defined mentoring tasks should be attempted when possible, as the game allows. Take time between innings, as required, to meet and discuss issues - but remember that between innings elements of the game (warm-up pitches, substitutions, etc.) must take priority.

If things are not going too well (bad positioning, blown calls, etc.) do not dwell on the negative aspects. Discuss what should have happened and agree to either correct the problem now or, if a complex issue, mutually decide to defer working on that issue until after the game.

When things are going well it can be easy to forget the pre-defined tasks as you settle in and enjoy the game. Talk about why you are enjoying the game so much as you discuss aspects of your game - positive attitudes can have an affect on the whole umpiring crew which in turn can add value to the game for everybody.

During some games it may not be possible to work on, or discuss, any of the

planned mentoring tasks. When this happens you must be prepared to take advantage of what did happen during the game and use this experience as a basis for debriefing discussions after the game.

After the Game

You may only have a few minutes after the game, before getting ready for the next game, in which to carry out a debriefing. This time is very valuable and not to be wasted. The trainee should first be given the opportunity to discuss the game. The mentor must listen carefully and be ready to ask questions, correct errors, suggest alternative methods, provide rule interpretations and finish with a summary of the positive aspects (positioning, calls, decisions, timing, etc.) of the trainees' game. If a short term goal was set for this game it is important to discuss it to ensure that goal was observed and achieved to the satisfaction of both trainee and mentor. Keeping a diary to record each game, and the issues discussed during the debriefing, is recommended. Trainees should set at least one short-term goal for their next game, which should be recorded in the diary.

Long-term Goals

The information you receive from your mentor will assist you to plan your long-term goals. Such goals may be set for completion in a month or over a number of years (examples may include aiming for a specific level or future event). Try to set goals which are realistic and achievable, because overestimating one's own abilities is common and often a source of personal disappointment.

Understanding this Guide

Organisations and individuals intending to use this guide must understand the mentoring process and the terminology used. A training session conducted by an experienced umpire should be attended before taking part in any mentoring program. This guide is intended as a quick-reference reminder of that training.

Umpiring Tip

Brushing home plate - When you brush home plate, turn your back completely to the pitcher. Call time to avoid a play developing while your cleaning the plate. If necessary, do a quick sweep between batters and after a foul ball or other delay. Also, remember that the bottom of your shoe is not a brush. If there is enough dirt on the plate to merit a cleaning, do it with your brush.

Open National Championship – Sydney

This tournament was BIG. I feel as though I've written a whole report by just typing in the crew! For the first time the Open Women and Open Men were competing at the same national tournament and I felt very lucky and honoured to be involved (especially as a candidate).

With a full time crew of 18 and three part time umpires, logistics were always going to be an issue. With help from Cathy Kerr's husband (a 4WD and trailer as well), and also cars from NSW umpires, we managed to get our gear to Blacktown Olympic Park where we quickly used up every available space in the umpires room. More on that later.

After a ground inspection, we all walked over to the athletics stadium (5 mins away) for the technical meeting. Don Porter, ISF President, addressed the room and congratulated Softball Australia on 60 years of Championships, followed by the usual welcomes and instructions from the tournament management team, including Tricia in her role as UIC.

After wandering back to the park, we all jumped in the cars and headed back to the accommodation at Parklea Holiday Park. There were 4 bungalow type units that slept up to 10 people. So basically one "parent" room with a queen bed and 2 "kiddy" rooms, each with 2 sets of bunk beds. In our unit, Darren and I shared a room, Damien and Darrell shared another and George got the queen bed. No one wants to see a grumpy George.

After a little bit of shopping (including refreshments, of course) we headed to Rooty Hill RSL club for the Diamond Days celebration dinner. I know I shouldn't, but the name Rooty Hill still makes me snigger. Must be the child in me.

The highlight of the night was Ken Culpitt's induction into the ISF Hall of Fame, presented by Don Porter. It was also good to catch up with Margo Koskelainen, Viv Triplett and Al McAuliffe, who I must admit seemed like he was trying to hide. Big Al trying to be inconspicuous? Riiiiight. A good night was had by all, some better than others, especially some lady who dropped an entire tray of drinks during Don Porter's speech. The remainder of my games were, luckily, uneventful and it was a great relief to find out on Saturday night that Amanda and I had both passed our assessment.

The crowd for most of the tournament was very good, but grand final day saw the stadium fill quickly and I don't think I've seen a tournament so well supported. The atmosphere was fantastic and it would have been a great experience to be on the diamond for the grand finals. Congratulations to Leigh, Andy, Bruce and Damian for getting the nod for the men's GF and Di, Debbie, Kevin and Warren for getting the women's.

The closing ceremony was fantastic. The winning teams were brought out onto the field on Harley Davidson bikes – what a sound! Amanda and I received our certificates and, as you can imagine, were very pleased with ourselves. Then each level 6 umpire received their Australian Cap and certificate. It was great to see the teams and crowd applauding the umpires receiving their caps.

Then the lights at the park went out and the fireworks began. Going for 20 minutes, the fireworks were a fitting close to a week long celebration of 60 years of National Championships.

When we got back to the change room after the ceremony, several people asked if Amanda and I were going to get a cap. Leigh very kindly provided two hats for us. See the photo – you'll see how generous Leigh was :-)

I think everyone who attended would agree that the organisers did a sensational job. Cathy Kerr, the groundsmen and all the volunteers did a wonderful job and the planning that had gone into the event was obvious.

Thanks to our liaison officers, Sandra and Jess, for keeping us fed and our stock of goodies full. Thanks also to the NSW umpires who used their vehicles to provide transport.

Finally, I'd like to thank the entire crew for making the tournament the success (in all ways!) that it was.

Umpiring Tip

Recovery Time - When you work the plate, you likely appreciate catchers who catch or block the ball, thus preventing potential injury. You can return the favour by giving the catcher some recovery time if he's shaken up. You don't have to draw attention to the situation; there are a couple of subtle acts you can perform to give the catcher some recovery time. Dust the plate (whether it needs it or not) or walk a few slow steps toward the mound to give the pitcher a fresh ball. Once back in your position, ask the catcher if he's OK. You'll be surprised how many catchers will thank you for the gesture.

2007 Softball Australia Exam (May 28 2007)

The 2007 Softball Australia exam date is fast approaching. (May 28 2007) Wow how time flies when you're having fun. Time to hit the rule books, especially the case book, and get yourself involved in your local club or Association rule sessions.

There are two separate umpires rules exams in Australia, the Basic Exam and the Australian Exam, so we want to know how many Basic and Australian exams are required.

The Basic Exam is a simplified version of the Australian Exam, it contains rule book verbatim questions, every day issues on the diamond and it is presented in an easier format for the person who is an umpire, a first timer or just wants to brush up on their rule knowledge.

You do not have to be an umpire to sit this exam, in-fact players, coaches, administrators and anyone who has an interest may complete the exam. It is a very good place to start. So come test yourself.

Umpires wishing to become a level one can also sit this exam, "come on be a candidate today!", come and enjoy the testing but fun side of the game. The basic exam can in-fact be sat anytime on or after the 28th May 2007, talk with your Association or Umpires co-ordinator.

However, if you wish to present yourself for examination for levels 2 – 6 or are attending nationals you will need to sit the Australian Exam on the 28th May.

Your help is required to enable me to order and have printed sufficient copies of the exam for all states, so I would ask that you talk with your state Affiliates and advise them that you require a copy of the exam for 2007.

Affiliates need to notify their State Umpire in Chiefs and intern the National Umpiring Committee by the March 1.
